Berlin Trip

Very early on Saturday 15 October, 30 THS students and four members of staff headed off to Manchester Airport for a joint History and German visit to Berlin.

After a wonderful flight and an exciting first trip on the U-bahn, they arrived exhausted at the Hotel Acama in the Kreuzberg area of the German capital.

Whilst in Berlin, students visited a wealth of historical sites, learning not only about World War 2 but also the Cold War and life after the "Wende" in 1989. They were able to see first hand where history happened and Mr. Meyerhoff recounted the various events that happened in those locations.

First on the agenda was a visit to the Bundestag (German parliament) and a quick lesson on the dative case from Frau Butterfield followed by learning about the Reichstag fire and the role of this historic building in the rise of National Socialist. They then moved onto the Brandenburg Gate, a respectful visit to the Holocaust memorial and down Unter den Linden to enjoy some retail therapy in the Ampelmann Shop. Frau Butterfield found the earrings that she had longed for for years!

After lunch we moved onto Bernauer Strasse for a look at life during the Cold War and events on and around the Berlin Wall. It was fascinating to see where East Berliner's had attempted to escape to the West by digging tunnels. They were then able to enjoy a trip to the Berolina Bowling Lounge for an evening of strikes and spares. The second day in Berlin began with a visit to the Topography of Terror to



learn of the rise of National Socialism and its effects on Germany. We also saw the longest in-tact section of the Berlin Wall. Moving on they visited Checkpoint Charlie and enjoyed seeing Berlin from above with a visit to the famous Fernsehturm (TV Tower) at Alexanderplatz. The day continued with a visit to the Eastside Gallery, where sections of The Wall have been put together and graffiti artists from around the world have been invited to display their work. Students particularly enjoyed the famous Honecker / Brezhnev mural and the Trabi coming through the wall. In the evening students visited the dome and terrace of the Bundestag which was amazing.

The final day was a little damp to begin with however, spirits remained high as the group took the U-bahn out to the Olympic Stadium and found out about how Hitler used the 1936 Olympic Games to further the cause of the National Social Party. They also learned about the role the stadium plays nowadays in major international sporting events and as a music venue. Students topped the day off with some retail therapy at the Mall of Berlin, while staff enjoyed the biggest donuts they had even seen! It was wonderful to see the return of visits abroad and how they can really make language and History come alive!

We were treated to stunning playing from the entire orchestra as well as a faultless performance of the Tchaikovksy violin concerto by Eldbjorg Hemsing - a violinist who's been hailed for her "swashbuckling bravado" and she really needed to be brave with this ferociously difficult piece! The orchestra accompanied her sensitively and allowed her playing to really shine.

Italian-Turkish conductor Nil Venditti got the audience engaged immediately with her lively

descriptions and introductions of the pieces, and even let us choose our own encore!

Students really enjoyed listening to the different pieces, each with their own distinct style and the lively, rhythmic syncopation and film-score nature of pieces composed in 2017 by Fazil Say got us all dancing in our seats.

Globe Theatre Trip

On Monday 7 November, Year 13 music students went to the Globe Theatre in Stockton for a visit to help prepare for an upcoming examination on the music industry.

We learned about the history of the theatre and how it was transformed from being in ruin to attracting the biggest names in music and comedy, such as Jimmy Carr and Mcfly, in a matter of two years. The Globe is adjoined to a smaller venue, named The Link where we met Josh Elliot, Creative Learning Producer. We toured the backstage of the theatre and were shown the technical parts of the theatre that makes the performance look and sound the best that it can be.

We prepared some questions and had a Q&A session with industry professionals who were from the Ambassador Theatre Group, who have theatre complexes around the world, where we asked them about health and safety, legalities and licensing. We asked about artist riders - special requests or demands that are made prior to a show booking - and they had many examples over the years, the weirdest rider being a dozen pairs of clean white socks and ten live trees, however, we also learnt that a rider is a lot more complicated than that because it gives all the specific details an artist wants.

We had noticed that half of the theatre was underground which is unusual, but he explained that this means even the people at the very back and the very front of the venue can get to safety easily because there are only two flights of stairs between them and any evacuation point in the event of an emergency. The theatre still has all the period decor from when it was built in 1935. We also saw posters from the time, restoration plans and historical items such as Beatlemania posters from 1963.

Our 'access-all-areas' tour took is into every part of the theatre, such as one of the main dressing rooms, where they have an original door where the performers signed their autograph as proof that they performed at the Globe. These included comedians Rob Bryden and Harry Hill, World Champion Boxer Tyson Fury and Astronaut Tim Peake. We returned to school with a range of different notes which could be used to help us prepare for our Year 13 examination after a very interesting and informative visit.
