# Christmas in Nursery


Christmas in Nursery is always a very magical time of year for our children and staff!

# Friction investigation

Lower Prep have been working very hard and enjoying every minute of their investigations about friction.

First, the children played some games of marbles. This was followed by an investigation into which surface would be best for playing the game. They had to think carefully about what they meant by the 'best surface' and worked together to settle on an agreement that the best surface would allow the marble to roll between 1.5 and 2 metres.

Next came the predictions, which surface would be best and what properties did each surface have that made it better or worse for rolling a dice?

The children soon decided that the roughness or smoothness of a surface



determined how useful it would be.
Too smooth and the marble went too
far, too rough and it would not roll.
Out of the choices of carpet, vinyl tiles,
polished wood, tarmac, grass and
astroturf most of the children agreed
the carpet was the best choice.

The next investigations all required 'chopsticks'. The children all tried picking up ice cubes, then ice cubes covered in salt and finally sugar cubes. They used these experiments to help form their understanding of how friction acts on different objects. It was lots of fun!


