The children were empowered by the new vocabulary they learnt when sharing this book and articulated and identified different emotions.

Tara: "My heart feels sad when I hurt myself but if I cuddle Mummy my heart is happy again. When I'm on my own without Mummy and Daddy my heart feels lonely but Mummy and Daddy are on my invisible string and in my house. My friends make me feel happy."

Ibraheem: "My heart feels happy because everyone is making me happy. They play with me. When it's dark my heart feels scared but I can put the light on and that makes it better."

Eva: "My heart feels proud because I can write my name. My heart feels happy when I share the toys. When I fell over my heart felt sad but my friends looked after me. I didn't hurt myself so my heart was happy again."

Hartlepool Power Station

Over the last couple of weeks, both Year 5 and Year 6 pupils have enjoyed a trip to Hartlepool Power Station to support their learning about renewable energy.

The children were welcomed by EDF staff who were able to give the children a comprehensive explanation of how they make electricity at their plant. They explained many aspects of their work and also told the children the advantages and disadvantages of nuclear energy. They also learnt more about uranium and the impact of a chain reaction.

Once the classroom based talk was complete, the children were kitted out in their helmets, eye protection and high visibility jackets so that they could



have a guided tour of the power station. This started with some safety checks before the children visited the different areas of the site.

The children were interested to learn that in an emergency the staff muster inside the building due to the nature of the hazards on site and how the huge tanks could heat 500,000 litres of water in only 17 minutes; a task that would take ten years in our domestic kettles at home! The tour then reached its peak as we were escorted around the turbine hall where the children were able to see where the magnet is located that spins 50 times per second.

A huge thank you to the staff at Hartlepool Power Station for their warm welcome and informative visit.

ESU Public Speaking Competition

Congratulations to the Public Speaking team who are now through to the next round of the English Speaking Union's Competition on Saturday 11 March at St Peters, York.

Alex, our speaker, was highly commended by the judges for his speech entitled 'Governments should be held to their pre-election promises.' Please enjoy a taste of what our fantastic THS team delivered on the night:

Benjamin Franklin once said 'promise may fit the friends, but non-performance will turn them to enemies'. Every politician finds themselves desperate to make friends in the run up to an election, it is a fact that real trustful friendship is soured when power is gained and pledges broken. It's as simple as betraying a good comrade or confrere. I wholeheartedly believe that governments should be bound to their pre-election promises and I hope I can convince you to join me in my point of view.

In 2019 our current conservative government was desperately trying to gain the confidence and vote of the electorate. As with all political parties they toured the country in buses emblazoned with the faces and slogans of the party and its figurehead.
