Prep School STEM Week

Prep School children had a busy STEM Week, exploring many areas of STEM and completing a host of challenges to broaden their knowledge and understanding of what can be achieved through these subjects.

Science – Children throughout the Prep School have enjoyed learning about fingerprints and comparing their own to others. They looked closely at their own fingerprints to determine which shapes they could see; whorls, arches or loops, as well as squeezing in some fingerprint artwork to take home as a souvenir of their learning. The children have also been interested to learn about DNA, Lower Prep children even having the opportunity to extract DNA from strawberries! To think more about the genetic codes that make up living things, the children were creative, turning their names into special codons so that they could make bracelets to illustrate a basic DNA structure. EYFS were also able to explore floating and sinking and magnetism through their engagement with the Little Steamers activities.

Technology – Our children are no strangers to coding activities however this week they were tasked with completing the CoderZ challenge. This Cyber Robotics challenge was sourced from Amazon's National Tech Ambassadors and provided opportunities to develop both hard and soft skills, alongside an engaging 3D gaming style interface. Thinking about the impact of climate change, Upper Prep have also completed a Net Zero Superheroes challenge. This is a



national competition where children have been asked to design an invention that would help our school move closer to net zero emissions. The children were incredibly innovative and we look forward to seeing whether any of our designs catch the attention of the judges.

Engineering – Engineering was a less familiar area to the children however they willingly accepted many engineering challenges. Upper Prep tackled a K'Nex challenge to work in groups to build a rollercoaster, thinking carefully about the importance of a sound structure to form a solid base. Upper Prep also received a talk from a virtual visitor; Trevor Gill, the former chief scientist of Vodafone Research and Development, giving an insight into how engineers can change the world. Many of the Prep children took part in the Science Buddies Ping Pong challenge, engineering a device to collect a ping pong ball from a distance. The children worked well to build and strengthen their designs so they could accumulate the most points.

Mathematics – The mathematics activities have been very varied. EYFS have explored number patterns and colour mixing, as well as counting and exploring shapes. Pre-Prep children have enjoyed making shapes using cocktail sticks and sweets, whilst our younger AG&T children were able to explore the rigidity of their shapes, looking at how triangles improved their structural integrity. Pre-Prep also enjoyed completing a paper chain challenge where they were tasked to create the longest paper chain using only one sheet of A4 paper. It is amazing how long the children were able to make their chains, thinking carefully about the mathematical concepts involved.





House Singing Competition

This week has seen the fierce competition of the annual House Singing Competition in which Cleveland were crowned the winners.

All three Houses performed songs from a variety of genres. They were complemented on their focus, smiling faces, call and response technique and choreography.

The children left the judges, Mrs Shevels and Mrs Williams, with a very tough decision and the deliberation took some time. Luckily, EYFS were on hand to share their own special song.

Cleveland were announced as winners for their rendition of a song called, Sing a Song in Unison, where the audience were reminded about celebrating the world in which we all share.

We had to wake early the next morning to get ready as we had breakfast at 7.30am. Next, we did a mission where we had to get a rocket into space, in which I was the commander and Izzy was the flight director and had a lot to say. Lewis (the pilot) and I got to go into the flight simulator where there were lots of buttons that we had to press. Just before lunch, we did the

5D cinema experience where we got to be in the rocket with Neil Armstrong on his way to the moon. Just after lunch, we went on the multi axis chair in which we spun around like an astronaut in a capsule. We did not feel sick as we had a piece of paper to focus on, it was really fun!

After that, we were told that we were going to make our own rockets and launch them on Monday. Izzy and I worked together and managed to wedge our motor into the end of the rocket.
