


The Very Hungry Caterpillar

They ended the tour with a quick introduction to the stick insects.

This was a fantastic cross-phase experience for the children and highlighted the benefits of having such wonderful facilities on site.

Science achievements

We are pleased to share some amazing Science achievements on behalf of our pupils.

Students have taken part in the National Scientific Thinking Challenge, organised by the University of Warwick. In the challenge, they had to analyse data from a variety of sources, including tables, graphs and charts, then draw conclusions. Out of the 15 students that entered, seven achieved a gold award, which puts them in the

top 10% of all entrants!

The Biology Challenge competition stimulates curiosity for the natural world and encourages students to take an interest in Biology outside of school. Over 43,685 students from 621 schools worldwide took part in this year's competition. We are very proud of our Year 9 and 10 students who achieved Commended - Gold awards.

Last month, students from 10T took part in the British Physics Olympiad Junior Physics Challenge. This encourages students to engage in an assortment of Physics problems and ideas. We are very pleased to share that all students achieved certification, with seven Gold, three Silver and five Bronze awards!

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
