They have looked at a variety of artwork and took inspiration from the willow pattern design.


Linking this with their Geography work, they created their own willow pattern designs using local landmarks.

As part of the IPC curriculum, the children in Upper Prep 1 have been considering the issue of deforestation and its impact on the global community.


