PARLIAMENT WEEK AT TEESSIDE HIGH

We were pleased to welcome Jacob Young, MP for Redcar, to address a selection of our students earlier this month.

Mr Young, the newly-appointed Minister of State for Levelling Up, spoke to the students about his role as an MP, his constituency role and his new duties working within the Government. He fielded a variety of questions from our students on topics ranging from the environment, cultural issues, Brexit and science and technology.

Mr Young, who was just 26 years-old upon his election in December 2019, discussed his experiences of being the country's youngest sitting MP and raised his pride at being the first Conservative to win the Redcar seat.

The talk was the first instalment in a series of highprofile guest speakers that aims to inspire our students as well as challenging them to form their own political opinions and viewpoints. Over the coming year we have speakers lined up from every major political party and from every level of political representation.

Politics at THS, despite being in its infancy as a





curriculum offering, is going from strength-tostrength. This year, we have our first A-level Politics cohort with students engaging in studies focusing upon democracy and participation, politics in the UK and comparative politics between the UK and USA.

Politics Club, chaired by My Meyerhoff, has begun running as a co-curricular activity which has seen students deepen their understanding of political issues and afforded them the opportunity to debate their views with each other. We also recently celebrated UK Parliament Week, where I shared an assembly introducing our Senior School to the functions of Parliament and its work in the legislative process.

We look forward to welcoming future speakers over the coming months as we build the profile of Politics at THS.

Last week they prepared their own slides to show organelles. Their chloroplasts were truly stunning.


Last week Year 12 students used chalk diagram to check their recall of the stages of mitosis.
