NORTH EAST PUBLIC SPEAKING CHAMPIONS!

On Monday 18 March, our public speaking team made it into the National Final of the prestigious ESU Churchill Public Speaking Competition for the first time in the school's history.

This is the largest public speaking competition in England and Wales. From over 400 schools, we are now one of the last 12 standing, about to engage in verbal combat against the fiercest orators from all around the British Isles.

Arriving at Dame Allan's School during rush hour was enough to get hearts beating and pulses racing. Max, Lou and Isaac however remained composed and cool, ready to face the might of St Peter's York, Malton School, Callerton Academy, Cardinal Heenan Catholic School and of the host's themselves: Dame Allen's. They, like ourselves, had made it through three heats to reach what was an incredibly competitive Regional Final.

Lou, our Chairperson, impressed the judges with her incredibly personable approach to the role. Max, our speaker, was full of confidence in the delivery of his speech and the answering of some rather tricky questions. Last but not least, our questioner Isaac, who has grown in stature throughout the competition, provided an articulate and thought-provoking series of questions. Together they epitomised the THS team spirit.

Max's speech was centred around the idea of fame and the performing arts. Well, after their performance, these students truly deserve to enter into the THS Hall of Fame themselves!

We are sure you will join us in wishing the pupils well as they take part in the National Final which is taking place at Churchill College, Cambridge University, on Sunday 5 May.

Here is a short extract from Max's winning speech for

Let's start off as any seemingly formulaic speech does. With a rhetorical question followed by a dictionary definition. What is fame? The dictionary defines it as the state of being well known and recognised for your achievements and skills. Prep School STEM Week

The children in the Prep School enjoyed the return of our annual STEM Week. This year we followed the theme of 'Time', set to coincide with British Science Week.

Children from EYFS to Year 6 experienced a wide variety of different activities around the theme and the smiling faces on the photographs demonstrate how much they enjoyed these moments of awe and wonder.

Pre-Prep children had lots of fun exploring evolution and designing new ways for humans to survive. These ideas ranged from extra eyes to stretchy arms so that we can reach objects and pull us to safety! The children enjoyed using thermometers to measure the temperatures of different hot drinks and observing the effects of different types of cups on the temperatures over time. The week progressed by looking into metamorphosis, with a particular focus on the life cycle of a frog. Towards the end of the week, the children considered their amazing brains and the connections that occur within the brain to help us learn new things. The children were let down by the typical British weather and despite making some lovely sundials, were unable to test them due to our cloudy skies!

The children in Lower Prep enjoyed welcoming visitors from The Links Primary School for a time capsule-themed primary liaison event. The children engaged in a handson workshop that embraced their creativity, problem solving and innovation skills. They had the opportunity to brainstorm, sketch and design their own futuristic inventions,

from incredible gadgets to ground-breaking solutions to everyday challenges. These inventions were then all bundled up into a time capsule for both schools to be buried in their school grounds. The children also loved taking part in a jelly experiment and making biodegradable plastic in the Food and Nutrition kitchen.

Upper Prep welcomed Isaac Bamfield, a civil engineer and Senior Project Manager for AtkinsRealis. Our older children and AG&T pupils were able to find out about his work, his opportunities of working abroad with Qatar Rail, the possible routes into this career and the personal skills required for this field. Upper Prep also welcomed children from Junction Farm Primary School to take part in a 'Stem-o-saurus' dinosaur themed primary liaison event. The children created scaled footprints of different dinosaurs before measuring their stride length and calculating their leg length, height and moving speed. These children also had the opportunity to make their own water clocks as well as preparing entries for the Leaders Engineering Award; a national competition to present designs to provide solutions for everyday problems.

These activities are by no means exhaustive but provide an overview of how the children spent STEM Week 2024!

Oliver! JR Production

Tuesday 19 March to Thursday 21 March saw our highly anticipated Oliver! JR production take to the stage.

An audience of around 500, a cast of 23, 78 bespoke cast t-shirts, three wonderful performances, three enthusiastic partner primary schools, one large, tasty Dominos pizza order, plus lots of Victoria Sponge and 'Rosie Lee': that's how our Oliver! JR production shapes up in numbers, alongside what has felt like infinite rehearsal hours! But what's the real story of this show?

Based on the iconic literary work, Oliver Twist by Charles Dickens, the musical adaptation Oliver! IR was written by Lionel Bart and first opened in London in 1960. It has since seen revivals, remakes, and transformations, including into a TV talent show, I'd Do *Anything*, which was fronted by Lord Andrew Lloyd-Webber in his national search for the next leading lady, Nancy Despite being full of tunes, glorious tunes, the London that is portrayed by Dickens, and not shied away from by Bart, is a dark, grim existence, full of hunger, desperation, crime and abuse.

Our cast have taken on ambitious choreography, complex harmonies and have all worked incredibly hard. As with all of our shows, the cast becomes like a mini family within the wider school, forging friendships across year groups and building their confidence enormously whilst doing so. Every year, they do all of this while maintaining their studies, representing the school in sports tournaments, competing in House events, upholding positions of responsibility around school and this year, even passing their driving test!

What a talented and dedicated bunch! There are too many standout performances to mention, with audience members saying it was the best school show they had ever seen and demonstrating their admiration with three standing ovations! We are incredibly proud of them all.

Last week, Senior and Sixth Form students participated in an array of activities to celebrate STEM Week.

Year 7 students enjoyed learning about fish! From watching their own tank, to helping fish migrate in Dutch canals with the Fish Doorbell webcam. They also carried out a crime scene investigation following a murder at Hogwarts. Year 8 students made copper sulfate crystals, linking together some of the work they have been exploring on acid reactions and separating techniques. They also

completed an 'Iodine clock challenge', experimenting with different volumes of the solutions to see which team could get the colour change closest to 118 seconds. Year 10 students were consolidating their learning on the human transport system through examining hearts. Year 12 students developed their dissection skills for the practical component of AS Biology.

North East Festival of Languages

It was an exciting week in the MFL department last week as students celebrated the North East Festival of Languages. On Monday morning Year 8 were treated to pain au chocolat and brioche in the dining room while they took part in a 'Where can languages take you?' webinar organised by the British Council.

The students listened to a range of speakers explaining how language learning in school can open up a world of opportunities as it is a transferable skill. It was particularly interesting to hear from Maura who works for GCHQ who told us that they were looking for people speaking Mandarin, Russian or Arabic to join the agency. These languages can be learned 'ab initio' at university if you have an A-level in

a different language such as French and German. She also mentioned that the linguists at GCHQ receive additional payments as language skills are in such high demand!

On Wednesday, Year 12 French students travelled to Northumbria University in Newcastle to take part in a French taster session. The students were fully immersed in the language as they heard a lecture about history in French film and in particular how the Holocaust has influenced French cinema. They also took part in a seminar on the subject of fast fashion where they put their interpreting skills to the test.

It was a great experience to meet the lecturers at the university and gain an insight into life as a language student.


Inter-Schools Classics Quiz
