# NEW NETBALL AND TENNIS FACILITY

#### We are delighted to share photographs of our new netball and tennis facility!

The new courts have been upgraded through the installation of a new multi-sports surface course, laid to the Lawn Tennis Association, the governing body of the sport in Great Britain, and British Standard.

A change in the orientation and an extension of the courts in two directions has made the space suitable for both professional tennis and netball – designed also to meet England Netball requirements.

This extension has taken the playing space to almost 1250m2, with increased side run off between courts.

To finish this new upgrade, an acrylic slip resistant coloured surface and new fencing, posts, nets, netball sockets and equipment have been added to the space, creating an incredible facility for our outstanding players to further develop their talents.

Our U13A Netball team was one of the first to utilise our new courts and played fabulously against All Saints, securing an impeccable 52-6 victory.

We are very excited for our students to enjoy this new facility and continue their run of fantastic sporting results.

Parents and the wider community are invited to view the new space at our upcoming Family Fireworks Display on Tuesday 5 November.

greetings, numbers, animals and colours in German. Wunderbar!



Their mission? To help everyone get up to speed with the various applications used in Prep lessons.



The highlights of their visit were the renowned David Hockney exhibition, a display that captivated students with its bold use of colour and modernist techniques, and the emotive scene portrayed in The Execution of Lady Jane Grey by Paul Delaroche.



The next stop on the Art itinerary was The National Portrait Gallery, a key visit for Year 10 and Year 11 students. For those studying portraiture and identity projects, the gallery provided an enriching experience. Students observed a wide array of portraits and were also able to view the submissions for the prestigious Herbert Smith Freehills Award 2024.

The group then enjoyed a brief stop at the Royal Academy of Arts, where students had the opportunity to explore the Michael Craig-Martin exhibition, an artist they were currently studying in class, making the visit especially relevant to their studies. All were enthralled by the bright bold paintings.

The day culminated with a visit to The Frameless Exhibition, a unique immersive art experience. In four galleries, students were able to 'step inside' 42 masterpieces, experiencing the works of celebrated artists such as Cezanne, Kandinsky, Dali, and Van Gogh in a whole new way.
