



Senior Students Take Off at Teesside International Airport

This trip to our local airport was designed to give some of our Able. Gifted and Talented students a firsthand look at the aviation industry and explore the many roles that keep an airport running smoothly.

The visit included an engaging session on the history of Teesside Airport. From its World War II origins as RAF Middleton St. George to its evolution into a vital regional transport hub, students were fascinated by how the airport has adapted over the decades to meet modern travel demands, not least the Jet Centre, the airport's private aviation terminal. Students got a rare glimpse into the world of executive travel, learning about the specialist services provided to private jet passengers, such as the King and Queen and the highly skilled staff who ensure everything runs smoothly behind the scenes.

Students met professionals from various departments including air traffic control, ground services, passenger experience and aviation security. It was interesting to learn about behind-the-scenes roles they hadn't previously considered - from logistics coordinators to operations managers - giving them a real sense of the diverse opportunities available in

aviation beyond becoming a pilot or cabin crew.

No visit to Teesside Airport would be complete without a stop at the Sky Bar, where students enjoyed panoramic views of the runway while chatting informally about what they had learned. The trip left students feeling inspired and more informed about their post-school options and we are proud to see them engaging so thoughtfully with their future possibilities, including for some, learning to fly!
