ENGLAND NETBALL NATIONAL SCHOOLS' REGIONAL ROUND

Our U14 netball squad has officially secured a place in the Regional Round of the England Netball National Schools' Competition after a fantastic County Tournament at Barnard Castle School.

These girls are one of only a few teams in Teesside High School's history to secure this achievement and put themselves forward to compete against some of the best teams in the region.

Against strong opposition, including Barnard Castle, Yarm School, English Martyrs and Carmel, the girls were introduced very quickly to the peaks and troughs of tournament netball - their talent, resilience and teamwork taking them through to a Runners Up position, with Barney taking the win.

Several matches saw the girls take a few goal lead and then be left with the difficult second half task of maintaining this when other teams were growing in determination.

A special mention to Katie, an U13

player, who stepped up brilliantly to make the U14 squad this year, showing maturity and composure beyond her years. Finally, to the team's Captain Amelie, who recently returned from long term injury and delivered a phenomenal shooting display, achieving a 92% success rate in the match against Yarm and a perfect 100% in the fixture versus Carmel.

With their second-place finish, the team has cemented their right to compete in the Regional Round of the competition which will take place on Saturday 31 January 2026. Confidence is high as the squad now turns its focus to planning what the campaign ahead has in store - in what could become one of Teesside High's most successful netball seasons.

Oriental Museum Trip

Lower Prep enjoyed a visit to the Oriental Museum at Durham University to take part in an Ancient Egyptian day to support their IPC unit, *Temples, Tombs and Treasures*.

The children took part in four activities throughout the day. They began as artefact investigators, learning how to handle 2,000–4,000-year-old objects before sketching, measuring and examining them to work out their purpose. They were amazed to discover they had been holding canopic jar lids, scarab amulets, make-up pots and shabtis.

Next, they completed a gallery trail, answering questions and exploring displays to learn about Egyptian life, religion, jewellery and writing.

After lunch, the children enjoyed a hands-on drama session, re-enacting the weighing of the heart ceremony. The final activity was a visit to a second gallery to view a real mummy, where they learned about a 65-year-old priestess originally buried in the Valley of the Kings.
